# WHO FILES FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE?

### Form 6

Full & Public Disclosure of Financial Interests (5,000 +filers)

- All constitutional officers
- •Art. II, s. 8(a), Fla. Const.
- s. 112.3144, F.S.

### Form 1

Statement of Financial Interests (35,000+ filers)

- **Local Officers** (including all pension trustees)
- Specified State Officers
- Specified State Employees
- s. 112.3145, F.S.

### **KEY FORM 1 DISCLOSURE FACTS**

- Form 1 initially due within 30 days of appointment or election to public office
- Forms are due annually by July 1 each year
- Penalty free grace period until Sept 1
- After Sept. 1, automatic fines of \$25/day for up to 60 days (\$1,500)
- Fines may be waived by the Commission pursuant to an appeal indicating that "unusual circumstances" prevented timely filing
- Failure to file financial disclosure in any calendar year can result in removal from public office/employment if willful
- Final disclosure form (Form 1F) due within 60 days of leaving public office/employment
- NO actual dollar amounts are required to be disclosed on the Form 1!

- •All financial disclosure forms must be e-filed using the Electronic Financial Disclosure Management System (EFDMS)
- •Launched on January 1, 2022.
- •Enables the electronic creation, submission, and publication of financial disclosures.
- •All local filers will no longer receive a paper form or file with Supervisor of Elections

### EFDMS PROCESS & RESOURCES FOR FILERS

### **EFDMS Process**

- •EFDMS walks filers through each section of disclosure via Q&A process
- Affords more options for financial disclosure creation
- •Filers may attach documents as needed
- •Filers may enlist the assistance of an attorney or accountant to complete and submit Form 1 via EFDMS


- •EFDMS provides filers with pop-outs during process and FAQs





## **CONFIDENTIALITY EXEMPTIONS**

- •Certain filers, including current or former law enforcement personnel, are eligible to request the redaction of certain personal information from their financial disclosure filings. See Section 119.071, F.S.
- By law, a **notarized confidentiality request** MUST be received by the Commission before agency staff can apply redactions. Requests cannot be submitted as a part of the electronic form.
- Local filers who previously filed with their Supervisor of Elections and were designated as confidential filers, must file a NEW notarized, written request with the Commission to be designated a "Confidential Filer" in EFDMS.
- •Public records exemption request forms are available on the Commission's website and can be submitted NOW! <a href="https://ethics.state.fl.us/Documents/Forms/PublicRecordsExemption.pdf">https://ethics.state.fl.us/Documents/Forms/PublicRecordsExemption.pdf</a>
- •After a confidential filer's form is filed, your filer dashboard in EFDMS will id you as a Confidential Filer and confidential info is redacted by EFDMS, prior to publication of forms on the website.

## REDACTION REQUEST

#### **Public Records Exemption Request**

Florida law provides that an agency shall treat social security numbers, bank account numbers, and debit, charge, and credit card numbers as automatically exempt from public disclosure. In addition, Florida law allows eligible persons to submit a written and notarized request that a non-employing agency maintain as exempt from public disclosure certain identification and/or location information contained in records within the agency's custody.

The person entitled to the additional exemptions must submit a written and notarized request directly to this agency to maintain the exemption to the records in our custody. § 119.071(4)(d)3., F.S. You are not required to use this form; however doing so will help us keep your information confidential. Please return this completed form or a written and notarized request to: Florida Commission on Ethics, P.O. Drower 15709, Tollohossee, Florida 32317.

If you or your spouse qualify; or if you are the child of someone who qualifies; you are eligible to receive additional public records exemptions. Please check the box for any of the following that apply:

# ADDITIONAL FORM 1 FILING INFORMATION

- •If applicable, file your Request for Confidentiality form as soon as possible to ensure that the EFDMS system identifies you as a confidential filer eligible for redaction of personal information.
- Download the full instructions for the Form 1 available on the EFDMS website now!
- Plan to file your Form 1 early and well in advance of the July 1 filing deadline.
- •Once you click "Publish" on your Form 1 "Statement of Financial Interests" it will be automatically published on the EFDMS website where it will be searchable by the public, free of charge, absent a Public Records Request.
- •Filers may amend a filing through the EFDMS via the Form 1X "Amendment to Statement of Financial Interests."
- If amended prior to Sept 1 in the year filed, the amendment will be treated as part of the original filing.

# NEW REQUIREMENTS IN FORM 1 DISCLOSURE METHODS

- In prior years, the Form 1 has contained two methods of calculating reportable interests:
  - The Dollar Value Threshold Methodology
  - → Percentage Threshold Methodology
- •After 2024 the ONLY manner of calculating reportable interests on the Form 1 is the Dollar Value Threshold Methodology. See s.112.3145(3), F.S.
- •Under the Dollar Value Threshold Method filers disclose interests exceeding certain statutorily identified dollar value thresholds.
- •However, NO actual dollar values are required to be disclosed on the Form 1!

# Completing The Form 1 Using The Dollar Value Method: **Primary Sources of Income**

- Requires disclosure of your principal sources of income during the previous calendar year.
- Identify each source of gross income over \$2,500.
- •"Gross income" means the same as it does for income tax purposes, even if the income is not actually taxable.
- Must disclose each source's name, address, and description of business.

- Do NOT disclose public salary or public positions!
- Do NOT disclose income of spouse.
- •BUT if there is joint income from property jointly owned (such as interest or dividends from a bank account or stocks) that > \$2,500 than must disclose.
- Do NOT have to disclose child support but DO disclose alimony.

# NEW EXEMPTION FOR ATTORNEYS EFFECTIVE 2024

Effective in 2024 a new exemption was enacted for attorneys that file financial disclosure s. 112.3145(3), F.S.



If disclosure of primary or secondary sources of income or liabilities will place you in violation of confidentiality or privilege pursuant to law or rules governing attorneys, you may write "Legal Client" in each of the disclosure fields without providing any further information

## Dollar Value Method: Secondary Sources of Income

- •NOT income from second jobs—that income should be disclosed as "Primary Sources of Income"
- •Requires disclosure of major customers and clients of your businesses IF:
- 1. You owned > 5% of the business <u>AND</u>
- 2. You received >\$5,000 gross income from the business
- ► IF your interests and income exceeded <u>both</u> thresholds than must identify the name and address of each client/customer that contributed >10% of the business's gross income.

# How to Disclose: Secondary Sources of Income



- "Secondary sources of income" are the major clients/customers of businesses of which you own more than 5 percent.
- "Major clients/customers" supply more than 10% of your business's gross income that year.
- Business name; Client name and address; Client business and description
- Attorneys may write "Legal Client" for protected sources

## Dollar Value Method: Real Property

- List the location or description of all real property in Florida in which you owned > 5% of the property's value.
- NOT required to disclose real property located outside of Florida.
- **NOT** required to list your private residence(s).
- You SHOULD list any vacation homes <u>if</u> you derive income from them.
- •Value of the property may be determined by the most recently assessed value for tax purposes or more accurate fair market value.

## Dollar Value Method: Intangible Personal Property


- Identify any intangible personal property that was worth\$10,000 during the previous year.
- Examples: bank accounts, stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit, vehicle leases, interests in businesses, beneficial interests in trusts, money owed you, Deferred Retirement Option Program (DROP) accounts, the Florida Prepaid College Plan, and cash on hand worth >\$10,000.
- Note that the product contained in a brokerage account, IRA, or the Florida College Investment Plan is your asset—not the account or plan itself. Thus, the \$10,000 threshold should be applied to the individual product and only those assets >\$10,000 must be listed.
- Identify the type of intangible personal property and the business entity to which it relates.

## Dollar Value Method: Liabilities

- •Identify creditors you owed >\$10,000 at any time during the previous calendar year.
- List the creditor's name and address.
- Attorneys may write "Legal Client" for protected client creditors
- Do NOT have to disclose:
- Credit card debt and retail installment accounts,
- Taxes owed (unless reduced to a judgment),
- Indebtedness on a life insurance policy owed to the company of issuance, or
- •Contingent liabilities (meaning a liability that will become an actual liability only when one or more future events occur or fail to occur).

### Dollar Value Method: Interests In Specified Businesses


- You must disclose ownership interest >5% in "specified businesses."
- These are businesses of a type specified in the instructions. NOT every business is a specified business.
- Examples of "specified businesses": state and federally chartered banks; state and federal savings and loan associations; cemetery companies; insurance companies; mortgage companies; credit unions; small loan companies; alcoholic beverage licensees; pari-mutuel wagering companies, and utility companies.
